The first woman was King Edward III's wife Philippa of Hainault, who was made a Lady of the Garter in 1358. Between 1358 and 1388 several women, most of which were of royal descent, were made Ladies of the Garter. This is the list of the royal women who were or are Ladies of the Garter. When, upon his accession to the throne, Edward VII made Queen Alexandra a Lady of the Garter, he developed and expanded the medieval concept by allotting her a stall in St George's Chapel where her crown and banner were displayed. Garter King-of-Arms, Sir Albert Woods, pointed out that this was not in accordance with the Statutes of the Order.

Nine other Ladies of the Garter followed, the most recent being the present Queen's cousin, Princess Alexandra, The Honourable Lady Ogilvy (2003). However, these Ladies were not true Companions of the Order and do not have stall plates affixed to the stalls they occupied in St George's Chapel. In contrast, the three Ladies Companion admitted since the 1987 Statute – Lavinia, Duchess of Norfolk (1990), Baroness Thatcher (1995) and Lady Soames (2005) – all have stall plates in the Quire.

Except for female sovereigns, the next Lady of the Garter named was Queen Alexandra, by her husband King Edward VII. King George V also made his consort, Queen Mary, a Lady of the Garter and King George VI subsequently did the same for his wife, Queen Elizabeth.

The last woman to be so privileged was the mother of Henry VII, Margaret Beaufort (d. 1509 CE). Thereafter, only men could be members of any kind, except queens. From 1987 CE the order accepted women as members again, this time with full rights and known as Lady Companions of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

The king inaugurated the Order of the Garter with a great feast and joust, but the identity of the lady thus granted immortality is uncertain. The most popular candidate is Joan, "Fair Maid of Kent," the king's cousin, but Katharine Grandison, Countess of Salisbury, has a strong claim, and one Tudor historian named the lady as the queen, Philippa of Hainault.
